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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR 2024-2025

October 10th, 2024

Welcome session for new students

The IEE-ULB hosted an information session to welcome new master students. This provided an opportunity for the students to receive a detailed presentation of their programme from the academic coordinators, and to meet their fellow students and the student associations.



October 24th, 2024

Academic Year Opening Lecture

Our guest, economist Éloi Laurent (OFCE, Sciences Po Paris) opened the academic year 2024-2025 of the IEE-ULB with a lecture entitled “Les transitions justes en Europe – généalogie, principes et politique”.



December 2024 – March 2025

EUqualis guest lecture series

As part of EUqualis Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence, the IEE-ULB organised three guest lectures focusing on EU’s role in the fight against inequalities in the framework of health and climate policies.



February – April 2025

Narrating Europe / Raconter l’Europe:

Between February and April 2025, this seminar coordinated by François Foret explored the political, intellectual and artistic narratives of European integration. The 2025 edition of NarratEUR was opened by Enrico Letta, followed by seven other distinguished guest speakers.



February 28th, 2025

EU-Japan Forum

The 25th edition of the annual EU-Japan Forum brought together academics and researchers from across Europe and Japan to discuss a wide range of issues of shared interest. This year’s 3 workshops focused on: “EU and Japan Approaches to International Criminal Justice”; “Politics and culture inside/out: a new ‘policy-mix’ in Europe and Japan?” and “New approaches and challenges for the post-Fukushima assessment of nuclear risk”



March 3rd, 2025

AlEUMni Afterwork Networking

This convivial event took place off campus and was part of our efforts to bring the IEE community to life, and to cultivate an interdisciplinary, intergenerational and intercultural dialogue.



March 17th -19th, 2025

RED-SPINEL Annual Conference

The Conference included two expert panels on the subject, “Rule of law, liberal democracy, and economic governance in the EU”, followed by a keynote address by Professor Gábor Halmai (EUI) on “*Illiberalism within the EU: How to Solve the Value Crisis?*”; a workshop dedicated to the *Palgrave Handbook of Dissensus over Liberal Democracy* as well as a Forecasting exercise on the “Future Visions of Liberal Democracy in Europe”.



October 10th, 2025

Graduation ceremony of the 2024-2025 class “Anna Lindh”

The IEE-ULB celebrated the graduates of the Master in European Studies, the Advanced Master in European Law and the Advanced Master in EU Interdisciplinary Studies at the Grand Place of Brussels.

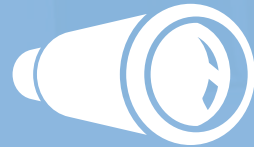

L'ÂGE DE RAISON DANS DES TEMPS TURBULENTS



En 2024, l'IEE fêtait ses soixante ans et, à la lumière de l'expérience, réfléchissait à ses structures, pratiques et ressources de concert avec ses facultés partenaires (Philosophie et Sciences Sociales, Droit et Criminologie, Solvay Brussels School of Economics and Management) dans le cadre des plans de développement stratégique. En 2025, il s'est projeté dans l'avenir en renouvelant la convention décennale qui le lie désormais à l'ULB jusqu'en 2035. Il a ainsi réaffirmé le principe de son autonomie en synergie avec la communauté ULBiste et son identité à la fois bruxelloise, belge, européenne et globale. Ce faisant, il trace son chemin singulier au prisme de l'interdisciplinarité, de la comparaison à travers le temps et l'espace et d'une libre réflexion critique à l'égard des questions européennes. L'IEE est une institution ancrée dans une tradition intellectuelle qui unit les générations se succédant en ses murs, tout en étant irriguée sans cesse par les nouveaux projets qu'elle porte. Cette dynamique entre institution et projets est le moyen de concilier les atouts de la recherche par contrats et de la réflexion de longue durée, de maintenir une continuité tout en faisant sens des disruptions. 2024-2025 marque l'achèvement de projets majeurs qui ont rythmé nos activités, et d'autres sont déjà lancés ou en gestation.

L'âge de la maturité, pour les institutions comme pour les personnes, est celui où l'on sait qu'il faut d'abord travailler sur soi, élargir et actualiser ses compétences, pour œuvrer au mieux avec les autres. Outre ses disciplines fondatrices (sciences politiques, historiques et sociales, droit, économie), l'IEE a ouvert en 2025 de nouveaux espaces d'expertise et de collaboration étudiant l'Europe au prisme de l'architecture, de l'administration

publique ou du digital. L'âge de la maturité est aussi celui où l'on doit affronter les rigueurs du temps. Année après année, à tous les échelons de gouvernance dans l'UE et au-delà, les défis s'accumulent et s'indurent : guerre, innovations à encourager et à encadrer, prospérité, justice et développement soutenable à harmoniser, aspirations individuelles et collectives à concilier... À son échelle, dans sa triple fonction de recherche, d'enseignement et de débat public, l'IEE s'adapte et en tire les leçons qui conviennent pour préparer au mieux ses étudiants et étudiantes au monde qui les attend. Être au cœur de l'Europe, dans un pays en paix en dépit des menaces, et relativement prospère malgré les inégalités, dans un milieu académique mis à l'épreuve sans être attaqué frontalement comme dans d'autres pays, est un privilège. Cela ne doit pas pour autant devenir une source d'aveuglement et d'égoïsme. Les batailles que d'autres livrent aujourd'hui seront les nôtres demain si l'on n'y prend pas garde. La mission de l'Université n'est pas de sauver le monde, mais elle peut contribuer à mieux le connaître pour agir, et à le mettre en partage pour rassembler.

Le dernier mot revient toujours à la jeunesse. Nos diplômé-e-s 2025 ont choisi comme nom de promotion celui d'Anna Lindh. Anna Lindh, personnalité politique suédoise de premier plan dans les années 1980-2000, fut notamment ministre social-démocrate de l'environnement et des affaires étrangères et s'engagea vigoureusement sur de grandes causes (notamment en faveur de l'euro, la solution à deux États dans le conflit israélo-palestinien et contre l'intervention américaine en Irak) avant d'être assassinée en 2003. Elle incarne ces figures qui, à chaque époque, viennent aux responsabilités sans renoncer à protester contre l'injustice et la démagogie et proposent un autre chemin. Ce patronage choisi par nos étudiants et étudiantes a valeur d'exemple.

LES ORGANES DE DECISION DE L'IEE-ULB

La gouvernance s'articule autour de trois instances. Le *Conseil de l'IEE* gère le fonctionnement général de l'institution. Le *Comité de la recherche* est en charge des questions scientifiques. Le Conseil stratégique, qui se réunit au moins une fois par an, discute de la stratégie générale de l'IEE avec l'apport de personnalités extérieures.

LE CONSEIL DE L'IEE



Le Conseil de l'IEE est composé des personnes en charge de la Présidence, de la Vice-présidence (si le poste est occupé), et de la Direction de l'Institut, ainsi que des doyen·nes des trois facultés partenaires (Faculté de Philosophie et Science sociales, Faculté de Droit et de Criminologie et la Solvay Brussels School of Economics and Management), des membres du corps académique donnant cours dans les programmes en études européennes, de représentant·es du corps scientifique, d'un·e représentant·e du personnel directement rattaché·e à l'IEE, des représentant·es des étudiant·es des programmes en études européennes, et de la personne responsable de l'administration et de la communication et de la logisticienne de la recherche de l'IEE.

Le Conseil de l'IEE a pour mission de suivre les affaires générales (relations externes, coopération inter-facultaire, coordination des activités...), l'enseignement (coordination pédagogique, avis sur les promotions...), de définir le règlement d'ordre intérieur, ou encore de constituer des commissions permanentes (évaluation pédagogique) ou temporaires. Il s'est réuni les 14/10/2024, 16/12/2024, 12/03/2025, 19/05/2025 et 25/08/2025.

Le Conseil de l'IEE se réunit au moins une fois par an en composition élargie (avec des invités extérieurs) sous la forme d'un Conseil stratégique avec des personnalités ayant travaillé dans le milieu des affaires européennes et qui assistent l'IEE dans la détermination de sa stratégie concernant l'enseignement, la recherche et le service à la société. La dernière réunion du Conseil stratégique de l'IEE a eu lieu le 18 décembre 2023.

LE COMITÉ DE LA RECHERCHE

Le Comité de la recherche est composé du/de la représentant·e de la Présidence, de la Vice-présidence (si le poste est occupé), et de la Direction de l'Institut, des membres du corps académique et scientifique de l'IEE-ULB investi·es dans les projets de recherches gérés par l'IEE, des chercheur·es (appartenant tant au corps académique que scientifique de l'ULB) affilié·es à l'IEE conformément à une procédure spécifique, et de la logisticienne de la recherche de l'IEE. Les collaborateurs scientifiques et les chercheur·es visiteurs de l'IEE sont les bienvenu·es à participer aux réunions du Comité de la recherche.

Il a pour mission de présenter au Conseil de l'IEE des orientations générales de politique scientifique afin d'établir l'agenda de recherche interdisciplinaire, d'encourager l'émergence de nouveaux projets interdisciplinaires et de coordonner la gestion de la recherche en études européennes à l'ULB.

Le Comité de la recherche est convoqué au minimum deux fois par an et fait rapport de ses activités au Conseil de l'IEE lors de sa dernière séance pour l'année académique en cours.

Durant l'année académique 2024-2025, le Comité de la recherche s'est réuni le 13 septembre 2024 et le 21 mars 2025.



INTERDISCIPLINARITÉ, ENSEIGNEMENT À LA RECHERCHE ET ANCRAGE DANS LE MILIEU PROFESSIONNEL EUROPÉEN

Ces programmes visent à offrir aux étudiant·es une expertise de haut niveau et des compétences transversales telles que la capacité d'une lecture plurielle d'un phénomène lié à l'intégration européenne et/ou ses effets dans les États membres. L'offre d'enseignement est régulièrement renouvelée de manière structurelle ou ponctuelle pour tenir compte, d'une part, des évolutions en matière d'enseignement et, d'autre part, des recherches menées à l'IEE par les membres des corps académique et scientifique.



MY EXPERIENCE AS A TEACHER AT THE IEE

It is an honour to be teaching at IEE a graduate course on career development. As I expected, students come from all over the world giving the class a true multinational and multicultural flare. I always enjoyed that. I say always, because I have been teaching university students for quite some time before I joined the IEE or the EU institutions. What I did not expect was how well educated and experienced students already are. Most, if not all, already have one or two Master's degrees while some already have started building a promising career. Naturally, Brussels is the place to be for those who want to work in the EU institutions, in national or international diplomacy, but also in the world of policy-making, policy-support and of national and international NGOs. My course aims to help students to cross the bridge between academia and the labour market, especially the job market of the EU institutions. The latter is constantly developing and getting a foot at the EU institutions can be quite challenging. Thankfully, nothing is impossible if determination is combined with the right knowledge and experience. That is why at IEE we try to combine the academic course with job internships and academic knowledge with professional skills. Guest speakers from various EU institutions, lobbying groups, consultancies, the public and private sector share with us really valuable insights.

ADVANCED MASTER IN EU INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES

ORGANISED BY THE IEE-ULB

ACADEMIC COORDINATION:
Prof. Chloé Brière

The Advanced Master in EU Interdisciplinary studies is a one-year programme organised by the Institut d'études européennes. This 60 ECTS Master, organised in English, offers students relevant academic knowledge in the field of EU studies that considers the recent evolutions in EU and global governance.

The uniqueness of this Advanced Master lies in its interdisciplinarity. The classes proposed are taught by renowned experts, reputed scholars and/or practitioners, who rely on their expertise and experience to tackle key issues comprehensively and reflect upon recent developments.

INTEGRATED INTERDISCIPLINARITY

Its interdisciplinarity goes beyond a juxtaposition of disciplinary approaches and views on the EU: in each of the three specialisation modules - **Economic Governance and Policies in the EU; Migrations, Rights and Policies and EU Integration; and Regionalism and Global Governance** - law, sociology, political science, history and economics are interwoven in a coherent way thanks to the intervention of professors from different disciplines within the same programme.

TEACHING BY GUEST PROFESSORS FROM OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE

The Ganshof van der Meersch Chair was established in 1995 in memory of **Walter Jean Ganshof van der Meersch**, founder and president of the Institute for European Studies at the ULB, holder of the chair of Public Law at the ULB, attorney general at the Belgian Court of Cassation and vice-president of the European Court of Human Rights. Walter Ganshof, who understood from the very beginning the potential of the Foundation, became its president after the death of Mrs Beddington. The chair, held at the ULB by a visiting professor from Oxford or Cambridge, focuses on the economic, historical, political and legal aspects of European integration or on public law.

During the academic year 2024-2025, the holder of the Ganshof van der Meersch Chair was Meredith Crowley, Professor of Economics at the University of Cambridge, on the recommendation of the IEE authorities and Prof. Glen Magermann.

The chair focused on the concept of market integration. Professor Crowley explored the European integration project within the context and under the umbrella of the post-WWII multilateral system. She focussed on the deepening of goods market integration through trade within Europe and around the globe from 1980 until the early 2000s and the slowing down, stalling or reversals that have taken place since the Global Financial Crisis of 2008. Professor Crowley also gave on 27 March 2025 a public lecture entitled «The uncertain future of economic integration for Europe and the world».

During the academic year 2024-2025, the Council of the IEE proposed to the Wiener Anspach Foundation to attribute the Ganshof van der Meersch Chair to Professor David Priestland, Professor of Modern History at the University of Oxford, for the academic year 2026-2027.

PROFESSIONALISATION ACTIVITIES

To fit the needs of students who already have a high level of disciplinary training, courses of this advanced master's programme are based on new pedagogical approaches, bringing together professors and experts from different professional backgrounds. In its curricula, the Institute places particular emphasis on professionalisation. In addition to the professionalisation seminar and the internship, the IEE organises recurrent activities, including mentoring sessions with IEE alumni, that allow students to create and expand their professional network.

INTERNATIONAL MOBILITY

The Advanced Master in EU Interdisciplinary Studies has a mobility agreement with Waseda University (Japan) and selected students can benefit from this internationalisation opportunity. The students following the module «EU Integration and Regionalism and Global Governance» can also attend a course taught by a scholar from Waseda University (Tokyo, Japan). In 2024-2025, the invited professors were Professor Paul Bacon from the Graduate School of Asia-Pacific Studies and Professor Tamio Nakamura from the Faculty of Law.



I am glad I chose the Advanced Master in EU Interdisciplinary Studies to resume my academic journey after some years of professional experience. The program not only strengthened my theoretical knowledge but also provided a practical perspective on contemporary EU issues. I was able to personalize my curriculum according to my interests, attending diverse classes taught by engaging professors. Thanks to the master, I had the opportunity to begin my career in Brussels, as I continue to work in the organisation where I completed the mandatory internship. Beyond traditional coursework, the Institute encourages active student participation through various activities. My experience with Eyes on Europe gave me a platform to pursue my passion for writing, while the project «Debate on the Future of Europe» allowed me to exchange ideas with peers from the College of Europe. At IEE I found a place where cooperation replaces competition and where students are encouraged to question, discuss, and shape the issues they care about.

Le Master en études européennes est une formation de 120 crédits, organisée par la Faculté de Philosophie et Sciences sociales avec le label de l'IEE-ULB. Ce Master vise à l'acquisition de connaissances solides sur l'intégration européenne ainsi que le développement d'une réflexion critique sur les enjeux européens. Il permet également aux étudiant·es d'interagir avec les praticien·ne·s des affaires européennes ainsi que de commencer leur insertion dans le monde professionnel.

Le Master en études européennes est un cursus bilingue, **dispensé en anglais et en français** qui offre un socle solide de connaissances permettant la réflexion critique sur les questions européennes.

Le Master offre le choix entre deux finalités.

- La finalité **Politique européenne** est centrée sur le fonctionnement des institutions et des politiques de l'Union européenne. Cette finalité laisse le choix entre le module « The multiple boundaries of Europe » et le module « Politics and regulation in the EU ».

- Finalité « **EU-Asia** », qui offre la possibilité d'un double diplôme avec l'Université de Waseda au Japon.

Le Master comprend un module commun d'enseignements dans les **disciplines fondamentales des études européennes**, à savoir : le droit de l'UE, l'histoire de l'intégration européenne, le processus décisionnel européen, la gouvernance économique et monétaire, et l'action extérieure de l'UE.

Un **séminaire de méthodologie** de la recherche permet notamment de préparer la réalisation du mémoire, travail substantiel qui met un point d'orgue au parcours académique des étudiant·e·s.

Le Master offre aussi un **module de professionnalisation** qui vise à accompagner les étudiants dans leur transition entre le monde académique et le marché de l'emploi. Il est enseigné par des praticien·ne·s spécialistes de la formation dans le domaine des affaires européennes qui aident les étudiant·es à construire leur propre projet professionnel. Cette démarche débouche sur la réalisation d'un stage qui permet d'acquérir une expérience professionnelle non négligeable pendant le Master.

Le Master en études européennes propose une partie importante d'**enseignements en anglais** afin de former les étudiant·es à la réalité multilingue du monde professionnel européen.

La structure du Master permet ensuite une **spécialisation disciplinaire**.

Le Master constitue ainsi un espace intellectuel qui vise à former, par la réflexion critique et appliquée, le citoyen, l'acteur politique et le professionnel de l'Europe de demain.

Le Master de spécialisation en droit européen est un programme en un an, enseigné en français et en anglais, qui s'adresse aux étudiant·es qui souhaitent approfondir leur expertise en droit de l'Union européenne.

Profitant de la localisation exceptionnelle qu'offre l'ULB à cet égard, il permet aux étudiant·es de **bénéficier d'enseignements de qualité**, dispensés par des enseignants aux profils variés, incluant des **chercheur·se·s de haut niveau reconnus** sur le plan académique, ainsi que des **praticiens partageant leur expérience pratique du droit de l'UE**, acquise au sein de cabinets d'avocats ou des institutions européennes.

Son originalité et sa valeur ajoutée tient à la diversité des cours offerts et les innovations pédagogiques qu'ils contiennent, permettant aux étudiant·es d'acquérir non seulement des connaissances solides en droit européen, mais aussi des compétences transversales utiles pour leur intégration professionnelle.

Les étudiant·es suivent plusieurs appartenant à **un tronc commun**, composé de cours abordant tant le droit européen économique (EU Competition and Internal Market Law), que les matières fondamentales du droit européen (droit constitutionnel, protection juridictionnelle, respect des droits fondamentaux, et EU External Relations). Certains de ces cours sont en outre complétés par des séances de travaux pratiques.

Les étudiant·es peuvent ensuite **par le biais de cours à option** choisir de spécialiser dans un domaine plus précis du droit de l'UE (droit commercial, politique migratoire, protection de l'environnement), garder un profil plus généraliste, leur permettant de découvrir les nombreuses facettes de la matière, ou même suivre certains cours interdisciplinaires liant économie et droit.

Capitalisant sur la position de l'IEE-ULB, et la proximité avec la bulle européenne, les étudiant·es ont régulièrement l'occasion de participer à des activités, telles qu'un procès fictif, une visite à la CJUE, *guest lectures* de professionnels de premier plan, ou encore un cycle de conférences en droit européen de la concurrence, leur permettant de **se confronter à la pratique du droit de l'UE**. Ces opportunités sont complétées par la possibilité de choisir entre plusieurs travaux de fin d'étude : la réalisation d'un mémoire académique, la réalisation d'un stage combinée à la rédaction d'un article, ou la participation au concours de plaidoirie « European Law Moot Court Competition ».

- Consultant in economics or strategy
- Analyst in national, international, public or non-governmental organisations.

- Business analyst and IT consultant



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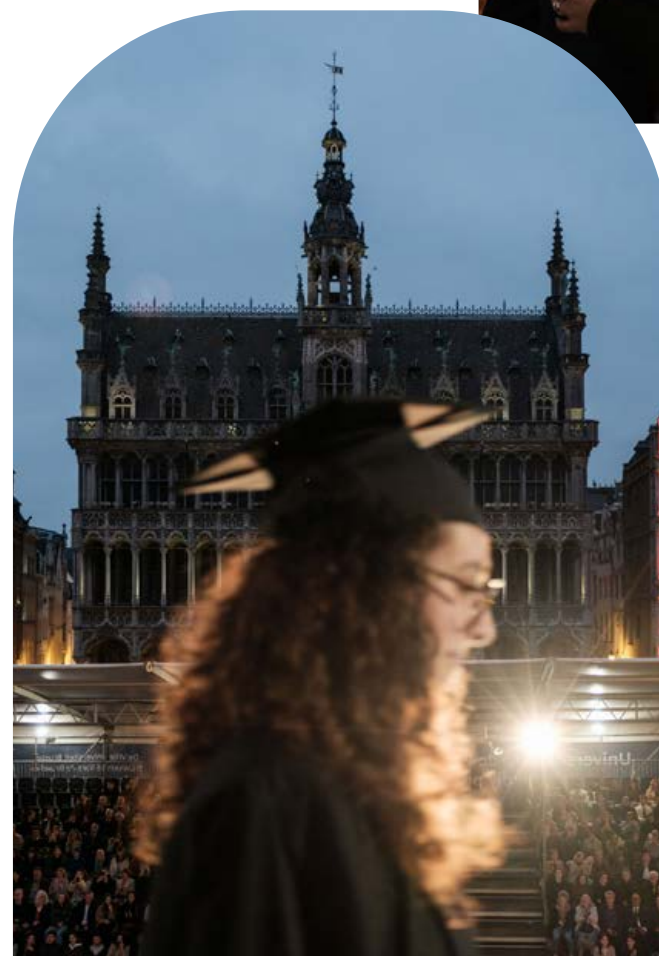

LES ACTIVITÉS DE PROFESSIONNALISATION

L'institut d'études européennes a toujours eu pour préoccupation de favoriser l'insertion professionnelle de ses étudiants et étudiantes dans le marché de travail, aujourd'hui particulièrement compétitif, des affaires européennes. Pour réaliser cette ambition, plusieurs activités, intégrées dans nos programmes ou en dehors de ces derniers, sont proposées.

LES COURS DE PROFESSIONNALISATION

Initiative pionnière à l'ULB, les cours de professionnalisation sont obligatoires dans le Master en études européennes et dans le master de spécialisation interdisciplinaire en études européennes. Il compte selon les programmes pour 15 à 30 % de la formation.

Enseignés par deux praticiens, M. Nicolas Dross et M. Emmanuel Sigalas, travaillant tous deux à la Commission européenne, les cours visent à permettre aux étudiants et aux étudiantes de mieux connaître la réalité du marché de l'emploi et à construire un projet professionnel en adéquation avec leurs envies et aspirations. Des cours théoriques sur les voies d'accès aux institutions européennes, la manière de construire un CV convaincant et rédiger une lettre de motivation percutante sont complétés par des présentations et échanges entre participants. La dimension professionnalisante de ces cours est renforcée par la participation régulière d'intervenants extérieurs travaillant dans une variété de milieux professionnels (secteur privé, consultance, ONG, etc.), visant à faire découvrir aux étudiants et étudiantes la diversité des métiers et fonctions auxquelles des études européennes peuvent conduire. Les cours sont complétés par des stages obligatoires d'une durée de 5 semaines, que les étudiants et étudiantes peuvent réaliser en Belgique ou à l'étranger dans le lieu de leur choix, et qui sont suivis de la rédaction d'un rapport de stage visant à tirer les enseignements de cette expérience. La recherche d'un stage est accompagnée en partie par les équipes de l'IEE, qui préparent notamment les listes de lieux de stage dans lesquels les étudiants et étudiantes ont été accueillis chaque année, et qui transmettent toute offre ou information pertinente reçue.

La réputation des cursus proposés à l'IEE permet à nos étudiants et étudiantes de réaliser des stages dans des lieux variés. Si les institutions européennes (Commission, Parlement) sont représentées, les stages sont réalisés dans des lieux variés, allant des administrations nationales et locales, d'entreprises privées, à des centres de recherche, des think tanks, ou encore des associations à but non lucratif (ASBL ou AISBL) représentant des intérêts divers.

MENTORING ET VISITES

La professionnalisation de nos étudiants et étudiantes est également accompagnée par des activités extracurriculaires qui se déroulent sur et en dehors du campus.

Une session de mentoring a été organisée fin avril 2024 afin de permettre aux étudiants et étudiantes d'échanger avec des mentors alumni de l'IEE sur les perspectives et défis rencontrés lors de la recherche d'un premier emploi dans la bulle européenne, ou de revenir plus longuement sur les carrières et débouchés possibles après des études dédiées à la question européenne. Cette session ouverte à l'ensemble des étudiant.es inscrit.es dans les programmes proposés par l'IEE (en ce compris le master de spécialisation en droit européen) a permis de réunir une trentaine de participant.es, étudiant.es et mentors confondus. Les discussions se sont prolongées de manière informelle autour d'un verre de l'amitié.

Ces activités ont été complétées par des visites des institutions, en particulier du Parlement européen et de l'OTAN, organisées par les membres de SAIES (Students' Association of the Institute for European Studies).

JEUX DE RÔLE ET SIMULATIONS

L'IEE prête également une attention particulière à ce que les activités d'enseignement théoriques soient complétées par des opportunités de mise en application, à travers des exercices de simulation, jeux de rôle, etc. Ces activités permettent également aux étudiants et étudiantes d'acquérir des compétences transversales, notamment en matière d'expression écrite et orale, qui participent à leur formation et à l'excellence de leurs profils.



EUROPEAN LAW MOOT COURT (ELMC)

L'*European Law Moot Court* est un concours international de procès simulé qui a lieu chaque année entre des équipes universitaires d'étudiant.es intéressé.es par le droit de l'Union européenne. Les contributions écrites et orales des participant.es restituent de façon réaliste le déroulement d'une procédure judiciaire européenne. La grande finale de cette prestigieuse compétition bilingue se tient annuellement à la Cour de justice de l'Union européenne au Luxembourg.

Les étudiant.es du master de spécialisation en droit européen participent chaque année à ce concours. Cette année, l'équipe était composée d'Inès Draoui, de Cédric Smolders, de Lucas Schoningh et de Martin Absil. Ils ont été une des équipes sélectionnées pour participer à une des quatre finales régionales, qui s'est déroulée du 7 au 10 mars 2024 à Madrid. Malgré une belle performance, l'équipe a manqué de peu la qualification pour la finale à Luxembourg.

SIMULER LA CODÉCISION

L'objectif du cours est de familiariser les étudiant.es avec la procédure législative ordinaire de l'Union européenne, via l'appropriation par la pratique et la simulation du processus décisionnel réel. Les compétences visées ont trait à la capacité de négociation dans ses multiples dimensions : connaissance des règles formelles et informelles, capacité à construire des alliances stratégiques/des majorités, capacité d'expression orale lors des sessions des institutions, gestion des contraintes liées au cadre de négociation (temps, réunions, secrétariat, etc.), maîtrise de la rédaction des amendements et de l'expression orale en séance au sein d'une commission parlementaire du Parlement européen ou d'une réunion du Conseil de l'UE.

Sous l'égide d'Amandine Crespy (Professeure titulaire du cours) et de Lara Querton (assistante académique), des étudiant.es de l'Institut d'études européennes ont ainsi endossé tout au long de ce premier quadrimestre le rôle de député.es européen.ne-s, représentant.es au Conseil de l'Union européenne ou Commissaire européen.ne. Cette année, les étudiant.es ont délibéré et voté sur le Règlement du Parlement Européen et du Conseil concernant les végétaux obtenus au moyen de certaines nouvelles techniques génomiques. Ce texte vise à faciliter l'autorisation d'une nouvelle génération de végétaux ayant subi des manipulations génétiques. Les controverses concernent les bénéfices de l'utilisation de ces plantes modifiées en termes de sécurité alimentaire (résistance au changement climatique) vs. le principe de précaution visant à en considérer les possibles dangers. Les négociations en trilogue (entre la Commission européenne, le Conseil de l'Union européenne et le Parlement européen) ont démarré au printemps 2025 et sont toujours en cours.

CONSIMIUM

Le Secrétariat général du Conseil de l'Union Européenne et du Conseil Européen a mis en place, en 2022-2023, un exercice annuel de simulation du travail de ces deux institutions, destiné à des étudiants et étudiantes. Dans ce cadre, les États-membres de l'UE sont représentés chacun par 6 étudiants et étudiantes de l'enseignement supérieur (master) qui simulent le travail du Conseil de l'UE et du Conseil Européen, à tous les niveaux, sur un dossier spécifique. La Commission et la présidence du Conseil sont impliquées conformément à leurs rôles institutionnels, en présidant les réunions simulées.

Au cours de l'année 2024-2025 Pauline Laloi, étudiante au sein du Master de spécialisation interdisciplinaire en études européennes a été sélectionnée pour faire partie de l'équipe belge.



"I had the privilege of being one of six Belgian students selected to represent Belgium during the third edition of ConSIMium, [...] Over two intense and stimulating days, we delved into the negotiation process, focusing on two critical proposals aimed at shaping future policies for the European Defence Industry and ensuring secure access to critical raw materials — both essential pillars for safeguarding Europe's strategic autonomy."

As Minister, I was responsible for defending Belgium's national position during the Council's meeting, while navigating complex negotiations with my counterparts from across the EU. Finding common ground between 27 different Member States was a real challenge, but it gave me a deeper understanding of EU decision-making and the importance of diplomacy and compromise."

SPECQUE



La Simulation du Parlement européen Canada-Québec-Europe, plus communément connue sous son acronyme SPECQUE, est une simulation internationale francophone du Parlement européen. Créée en 1998 par des étudiants de l'Université Laval (Québec, Canada), afin de mieux comprendre le fonctionnement des institutions

européennes et les grands enjeux de l'Union européenne, la SPECQUE est aujourd'hui la plus importante simulation francophone du Parlement européen au monde. Au cours de cette simulation, les participant.es – issu.es d'universités européennes, canadiennes mais aussi d'autres zones géographiques (Maroc, Liban, Caraïbes, etc.) – reproduisent le fonctionnement du Parlement européen.

L'IEE soutient la délégation ULB de la Specque. Plusieurs professeurs (Chloé Brière, Ramona Coman, Amandine Crespy, Paul Dermine et François Foret) en sont les marraines et parrains académiques, et l'équipe de l'IEE apporte un soutien dans l'obtention de financements.

Cette année marque la XXVII^{ème} édition de la SPECQUE. Celle-ci s'est déroulée du dimanche 20 juillet au dimanche 27 juillet 2025 à Bruxelles. Cette année, le nombre de participant.es fut supérieur à 150 venant de plusieurs pays et régions de la francophonie. Lors de cette simulation, les rôles occupés par les membres de la délégation ULB étaient variés : Clara Haslé et Maité Molina Vaquerizo jouaient le rôle de députées européennes tandis que Bilale Fayyad, Maria Radzha, Alicia Morelli et Stella Livolsi jouaient le rôle de ministre du Conseil de l'Union européenne.

SUMMER SCHOOLS

SUMMER SCHOOL OF THE EUROPEAN CRIMINAL LAW ACADEMIC NETWORK (ECLAN)

The ECLAN (European Criminal Law Academic Network) was set up by Anne Weyembergh and Serge de Biolley in 2004. Its activities were launched on 1 December 2004.

The network covers 32 countries, i.e. the 27 Member States of the European Union, as well as 5 non-EU countries (the United Kingdom, Switzerland, Norway, Iceland and Bosnia-Herzegovina) with which the EU maintains close relations in the field of policing and criminal justice. It brings together more than 150 professors and researchers specialising in European criminal law.

The ECLAN Summer School 2025, dedicated to *"The EU Area of Criminal Justice"*, was held from 30 June to 4 July 2025. This year's programme offered a comprehensive course on the external dimension of judicial cooperation in criminal matters. The Summer School brought together numerous speakers, both academics and practitioners, and attracted around thirty participants from across Europe and beyond.



ODYSSEUS SUMMER SCHOOL: EU IMMIGRATION AND ASYLUM LAW AND POLICY

This year, Odysseus Summer School took place from June 30th to July 11th 2025.

The objective was to provide participants with a global understanding of European Migration and Asylum policies from a legal perspective, including an analysis of the new legislation adopted under the New Pact and the Commission's proposals currently under negotiation.

The program is made of 3 parts:

- Introductory courses
- Migration, including visas & borders
- Asylum

In addition to classes, the summer school provided an opportunity to spend an intellectually stimulating time in a group of around 100 participants. To support students with refugee status, Odysseus launched a successful **crowdfunding campaign, supported by UNHCR**, to fund the scholarships for them. Additionally, as part of the Network's mission to support emerging researchers, **3 PhD students received scholarships** to participate in the summer school and receive feedback on their research projects from Odysseus members.

The classes were taught in French and in English by academics originating from many Member States and by high-ranking officials from the European Institutions, particularly the European Commission. On July 3rd 2025, the **Summer School celebrated its 25th anniversary**. Over the past 25 years, around 2,500 persons have attended this programme, highly valued by the EU Institutions, which send their staff for training, as well as by recruiters in the field, who find the programme an asset in applicants' CVs. To mark this special occasion, the 25th edition featured an exceptional event that reunited alumni, with testimonials from many prominent participants from different backgrounds who have attended the Summer School over its 25-year existence.



CYCLE DE COURS-CONFÉRENCE

LES MARDIS DU DROIT EUROPÉEN DE LA CONCURRENCE

Les mardis du droit européen de la concurrence constituent une tradition qui date de plus de 50 ans. Organisés par les Professeurs Jean-François Bellis et Denis Waelbroeck, ces séminaires sont consacrés à l'examen de divers aspects de la politique de l'UE en matière de droit de la concurrence. Ils sont animés par des professionnels de grande qualité, issus des institutions européennes et des plus grands cabinets d'avocats spécialisés en la matière.

Les séminaires de cette année 2024-2025 ont été consacrés à l'examen de divers développements importants de la jurisprudence des juridictions européennes et de la pratique et politique de la Commission. Les mardis du droit européen de la concurrence constituent un forum de discussions axé sur les interventions de différent.e.s expert.e.s en la matière. Les séances se déroulent en français ou en anglais et le programme de l'année académique 2024-2025 a été le suivant :

STUDENT ASSOCIATIONS

The Institute provides financial and logistical support to student associations each year, so that they can carry out their missions. The associations bring life to the IEE and contribute to the Institute's reputation.

THE STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION OF THE INSTITUTE FOR EUROPEAN STUDIES (SAIES)



L'Association des étudiant.es de l'Institut d'études européennes (SAIES) a été créée en 2015 par des étudiant.es de l'IEE-ULB, elle vise à offrir un forum de réflexion sur les questions politiques européennes actuelles. Son rôle principal est de représenter les étudiant.es de l'IEE-ULB et d'assurer la cohésion entre les étudiant.es de tous les masters en études européennes de l'IEE-ULB. La SAIES organise divers événements socioculturels liés aux études européennes, tels que des visites et des conférences.

Lors de l'année académique 2024-25, SAIES a organisé ou participé à l'organisation des événements suivants : débat avec le Collège de l'Europe, conférence sur les carrières internationales, événement de Noël, visite de l'OTAN, collaboration avec la Conférence Olivaint de Belgique, événement de Carnaval, 10km de l'ULB, visite du Parlement Européen, de la Commission Européenne et du Conseil de l'UE, et BBQ de fin d'année.

La **co-organisation du débat avec le Collège de l'Europe** a fort occupé notre début de mandat. De la communication à la sélection des candidat.e.s, en passant par le recueil des informations nécessaires, cet événement a rythmé le mois d'octobre.

Le vrai premier événement de l'année fut la **conférence sur les carrières internationales** mise en place en collaboration avec le BE Droit et l'association étudiante espagnole IURIS. Nous réussîmes à réunir environ 150 étudiant.e.s de l'ULB et des membres de IURIS. Nos invité.e.s de haut rang (une diplomate belge, une conseillère auprès de la représentation des Canaries, et l'Ambassadeur d'Espagne auprès de



la Belgique), ainsi que des représentant.e.s du cabinet Uria Menendez ont suscité l'intérêt nécessaire pour rassembler un tel public. La conférence fut suivie d'une réception *networking* qui a beaucoup plu.

La premier quadrimestre fut clôturé par la **soirée de Noël**. De nombreux.ses étudiant.e.s répondirent présent.e.s, et une Professeure nous fit aussi le plaisir de sa venue. Cet événement créa un réel moment de cohésion au sein de l'IEE et permit aussi de faire connaissance avec des étudiant.e.s en dehors de l'Institut. Le secret santa semble avoir été particulièrement apprécié.

La seconde partie de l'année débuta par la **visite de l'OTAN**. Ceci fut aisé à organiser et le nombre maximal de participant.e.s fut rapidement atteint. Travailler avec la **Conférence Olivaint** était plaisant et nous a permis de créer des connections et de renforcer la réputation de l'association et de l'Institut. Nous coopérâmes aussi avec l'Institut pour mettre en place **l'équipe de l'IEE pour les 10km ULB**. Les coureur.ses apprécèrent faire le parcours ensemble et le brunch, après l'effort, fut fort apprécié.

THE DEBATE ON THE FUTURE OF EUROPE BY STUDENTS FROM THE COLLEGE OF EUROPE AND THE INSTITUTE FOR EUROPEAN STUDIES

The Debate on the Future of Europe is an annual initiative jointly organized by the Institute for European Studies (IEE) at the Université libre de Bruxelles (ULB) and the Department of European Political and Governance Studies (POL) at the College of Europe in Bruges. It brings together students from both institutions to engage in critical reflection and dialogue on the main challenges facing the European Union today.

This year, after two meetings in Bruges in October 2024, and in Brussels in April 2025, the students prepared and published five policy briefs on the following issues:

- «The Gender Digital Divide Affecting Migrant Women»
- «How to make European elections more visible, accessible and representative to citizens?»
- «What role for the EU in the attempt to revive a nuclear deal with Iran - prospects and take-aways from previous JCPOA»
- «Rethinking the Concept of Safe Third Countries»
- «Strengthening Small Farms through Local Value Chains and Regional Food Hubs».

The choice of the topics, as well as the preparation of the policy briefs, was a truly-student initiative. Their recommendations are nourished by exchanges with experts from the EU institutions and EU bubble, who participated in the workshop held in Brussels.

RESEARCH

RESEARCH THEMES

RESEARCH AT THE IEE-ULB IS STRUCTURED ALONG FOUR CROSS-CUTTING RESEARCH THEMES

Rooted in the permanent scientific interests of its members and supported through collective topical research projects, scientific work at the IEE-ULB is developed along four main themes.

Europe as an Area of Freedom, Security and Justice

The IEE-ULB's first crosscutting theme of research is devoted to studying the creation and development of the European Union's so-called Area of Freedom, Security and Justice (AFSJ).

Europe as an Area of Economic and Social Regulation

The IEE-ULB's second theme explores the European common market, in terms of both integration and social issues. It focusses on European regulation, policy making, economic governance, territorial management and regional cohesion policy.

Europe as a Community of Norms and Values

The IEE-ULB's third research axis focusses on processes of cooperation, identification, and conflict generated by European integration and their role in the legitimization of the EU as a political entity.

Europe in the World

The IEE-ULB 'Europe in the World' crosscutting theme of research examines the European Union in terms of global governance: i.e. the interactions between global and European policies.

RESEARCH THEME 1

EUROPE AS AN AREA OF FREEDOM, SECURITY AND JUSTICE

Since the entry into force of the Treaty of Amsterdam, the development of an Area of Freedom, Security and Justice (AFSJ) has been one of the European Union's objectives. Given the considerable development of the fields encompassed by the AFSJ, such as cooperation on asylum and migration, or police and judicial cooperation in criminal matters - the IEE-ULB has chosen to make this a cross-cutting research theme. Most of the topics it covers are quite sensitive in terms of national sovereignty of states and protection of fundamental rights.

21 IEE-ULB affiliates are active in this research theme, which includes topics such as:

- State and borders in the EU;
- security and fundamental rights;
- judicial and police cooperation; construction/ deconstruction of security issues;
- asylum and migration.

One externally funded project - Erasmus+ Jean Monnet Module- Legal Clinic EU Criminal Law - focus on the understanding of Europeanization of national criminal law.

EXTERNALLY FUNDED PROJECT SUPPORTED BY THE IEE

PDR Impunity_EU (2023 – 2025)

- Administrated through the Centre de Droit Européen (CDE)
- Lead Researchers: Chloé Brière et Julia Burchett

DESCRIPTION

Funded by the F.R.S - F.N.R.S., the research project IMPUNITY_EU aims to examine the actions of the European Union (EU) in the fight against impunity for core international crimes. The EU has long participated in international efforts in this area by supporting the actions of its Member States and third States and by cooperating with relevant international actors. However, since 2022 and in response to the intensification of the war in Ukraine, the EU has adopted innovative and ambitious measures, for instance, in criminal matters or in the field of sanctions. The project, therefore, examines to what extent the Ukrainian crisis marks a paradigm shift in the EU's fight against impunity.

To this end, the project maps all the relevant measures to combat impunity over the long term. This classification is necessary given the fragmentation of the actions supported by the EU, the cross-cutting nature of the policies concerned, and the heterogeneity of the instruments used. The project integrates equally ongoing developments launched by the European institutions to respond specifically to the risk of impunity for crimes suspected of having been committed on Ukrainian territory. These developments, accompanied by sustained international efforts, push the EU (and EU actors) to act at the margins of its competencies. The project therefore also aims to assess these developments against the legal framework to which the EU is subject under the European treaties.

In the course of the academic year 2024-2025, the following activities were organised in the framework of the project.

- The book project on the EU and Japanese approaches to international criminal justice, co-edited by Shuichi Furuya, Shin Matsusawa, Anne Weyembergh and Chloé Brière, progressed with the organisation of a panel at the occasion of the 2025 EU-Japan Forum. The panel was the occasion for the authors to share preliminary findings on selected aspects of the ongoing research, such as the cooperation with the ICC, extraterritorial jurisdiction, the role of memory, or the criminalisation of corruption and money laundering.
- A panel entitled «Assessing the Enduring Effects of EU Crisis Measures: Constitutional and Legal Shifts in Response to Conflicts» was conveyed at the occasion of the bi-annual conference of the ICON.S Benelux Chapter on 22 and 23 May 2025. In that framework, Julia Burchett presented on her ongoing research regarding Eurojust's expanded role in the fight against impunity for core international crimes. The other presentations tackled the criminalisation of the violation of EU restrictive measures, the judicial review of such measures and the establishment of the European Peace Facility. Mr Fabio Giuffrida from the European Commission acted as discussant.

Two outputs in relation of the project were published: a book chapter by Chloé Brière, entitled «The EU's Response to War Crimes» in the collective volume *The impact of war (in Ukraine) on EU Law*, edited by Inge Govaere, Sacha Garben and Eleanor Spaventa (Hart Publishing, 2025); and a peer-reviewed article by Julia Burchett and Anne Weyembergh, entitled "Prévenir et sanctionner le contournement des mesures restrictives adoptées en réaction à la guerre en Ukraine. Les défis du contrôle juridictionnel", a commentary of the case *Fridman v. Council* (General Court (Grand Chamber), 11 September 2024, Case T-635/22), published in the *Revue Trimestrielle des Droits de l'Homme* (2025/4 N° 144).

PROSPER (2025-2028) “Project to Research Opportunities to Strengthen Prosperity and Economic Resilience in the EU”

- Lead researcher: Paul Dermine
- Funding: Erasmus+ Jean Monnet Network

PROSPER (Project to Research Opportunities to Strengthen Prosperity and Economic Resilience in the EU) is a three-year (2025-2028) Jean Monnet Network funded by the European Union's Erasmus+ programme. The aim of the PROSPER network is to strengthen knowledge sharing, promote best practices, and address contemporary challenges facing the EU through interdisciplinary research and educational initiatives. It focuses on exploring and enhancing economic resilience within the EU, by identifying and promoting strategies that can bolster economic stability and growth, particularly in the context of challenges such as globalisation, climate change, and economic disparities among Member States.

The project is coordinated by Dublin City University and its Dublin European Law Institute. ULB is one of the 12 partner universities. The team, which is coordinated by Prof. Paul Dermine, involves a number of researchers from the IEE, including Prof. Ramona Coman, Prof. Amandine Crespy, Ilaria Gambardella, Tom Massart, Pauline Thinus, Viola Shahini and Anna Zech. The team will produce research and organize events around the themes of social governance, democratic resilience and fiscal integration. The Project's Kick-off conference, entitled 'Rebuilding a Prosperous European Economy' took place in Dublin on January 22-24 2025. Two subsequent events were organised by the partners in Budapest and Magdeburg in March and June 2025. In September 2025, Amandine Crespy and Viola Shahini published a PROSPER Policy Brief entitled 'Bringing the European Pillar of Social Rights to Life – Lessons from Four Member States'.

RESEARCH THEME 2

EUROPE AS AN AREA OF ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL REGULATION

The IEE-ULB's second theme of research addresses European governance through the impact of its policy-making on European integration in such key areas as economic governance, territories and regional policy, common market and social issues. It combines two understandings of the EU as a political system: a mode of regulatory and redistributive governance; and a space of mobilisation and conflict. It includes the study of actors and mechanisms shaping collective choices in the European multi-level democratic regime (e.g. election and parliamentary representation; lobbying/interest representation). Collective projects analyse the challenges associated with inequalities of the EU as well as the history and prospects of Social Europe.

42 IEE-ULB affiliates are active in this research theme, which includes topics such as:

- Social policies
- Internal market developments
- Trade policy
- Competition policy
- Corporate governance
- Regulatory policies

EUqualis (2021 - 2025) ERASMUS+ - Jean Monnet Center of Excellence on “(In)equality and the EU”

DESCRIPTION

EUqualis is a Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence dedicated to the challenges associated with 'Inequality and the EU' hosted at the IEE-ULB. The project has guided the IEE's research agenda and activities for the past four years and it concluded in March 2025.

The research and teaching activities of EUqualis in 2024 and 2025 included the opening conference of the academic year by economist [Éloi Laurent](#), a researcher at OFCE and professor at Sciences Po Paris. His talk focused on **“Just transitions in Europe”**. The IEE-ULB also hosted a series of three guest lectures, organised between December 2024 and March 2025: **“Preparing for the next pandemic: the EU's expanding role in the fight against global health threats”** by [Éloïse Gennet](#) (University of Aix-Marseille), **“The EU's role in the global health & its cooperation with the WHO”** by [Elisabet Ruiz Cairó](#) (WHO) and **“Climate policies, social inequalities and the need for just transition”** by [Kalina Arabadjieva](#) (ETUI). The highlights this year for EUqualis also included the publication of the book **“Inequality and the European Union – New Frontiers in Political Science and Law”**, edited by Amandine Crespy and Chloé Brière. Some of the key findings of the book were discussed in March 2025 in the Book launch event co-organised with The European Social Observatory, entitled « Afterwork discussion on Gender Inequalities in the EU – Perspectives in the Light of the Digital and Green Transitions ».

ARC SOCITEU (2021-2026) Social rights in the European Union From market to social citizenship and back?

- Administrated through the Centre CEVIPOL
- Lead Researchers: Amandine Crespy and Nicolas Verschueren
- Funding: Action de Recherche Concertée (ARC)

DESCRIPTION

This project aims to investigate the developments of the social dimension of European citizenship since the 1960s through the lenses of political science and history. The empirical focus lies with the granting of transnational social rights related to social security (understood as a protection against social risks related to work, unemployment, healthcare, pensions, and poverty) to individuals. This ARC brings history “back in” in order to go beyond the legal issues at stake and the contemporary policy challenges. The purpose of the project is to explain under what political circumstances a European form of social citizenship has been expanded or, on the contrary, hampered and limited to a narrow set of market-based rights. To elucidate this, the focus will lie on political actors within social democracy (decision makers in national governments and EU institutions, intellectuals and experts, and trade unions) and how they have sought to promote a European social citizenship in ambiguous and fluctuating ways.

The project main objectives are (1) substantiating the conceptual and empirical distinction between market and social citizenship; (2) documenting the movement of construction and deconstruction of social rights over time; (3) connecting the development of a European social citizenship to the broader developments including the transformation of the political economy, political ideologies and the process of EU integration; (4) explaining how actors within social democracy have mobilised (or not) for a European citizenship at the national and EU level.

The ARC SOCITEU project carried out a rich programme of academic activities during academic year 2024-2025, combining workshops, conferences, publications, and dissemination. The cycle began with an online workshop on 11 December 2024, chaired by A. Crespy, S. Gaffney, and V. Shahini. It gathered 14 participants, including external invitees and SOCITEU members. The workshop introduced the project, explored the idea of a joint conference, and discussed potential publications, with each participant presenting abstracts for the forthcoming SOCITEU conference and special issue. The flagship event was the SOCITEU Conference, “Revisiting Market and Social Citizenship in the EU: Past and Present,” held on 1–2 April 2025 at the IEE-ULB. Chaired by A. Crespy, S. Gaffney, B. Kenn, V. Shahini, and N. Verschueren, it brought together 11 participants to present preliminary findings and debate contributions to the special issue.

Research outputs of the project included: peer-reviewed articles appeared in leading journals such as the European Journal of Social Security, Journal of European Social Policy, Journal of Youth Studies, and JCMS. Topics ranged from pan-European labour markets and platform work regulation to youth unemployment and parliamentary politics in EU social policy. Additional outputs included book chapters, working papers, op-eds, and essays addressing welfare reform, the European Pillar of Social Rights, and dilemmas in inclusion policy.

SOCITEU members contributed to the dissemination efforts by presenting their research at major international conferences. These included events at Northumbria University, Sciences Po Rennes, Scuola Normale Superiore in Florence, ESPANET Europe in Milan, and the ECPR General Conference in Thessaloniki. Papers covered themes such as unemployment politicisation, education marketisation, coalminers’ mobilization, and the dynamics of social rights. Collectively, these activities demonstrate SOCITEU’s strong engagement in advancing debates on European social citizenship, welfare reform, and the evolving balance between market imperatives and social rights.

RESEARCH THEME 3

EUROPE AS A COMMUNITY OF NORMS AND VALUES

The IEE-ULB’s third crosscutting theme of research focuses on processes of cooperation, identification and conflict management associated with European integration and their role in the legitimization of the EU as a political entity. It hinges on three observations: (1) the role values, ideas and norms play in European politics as issues, resources or obstacles; (2) the promotion of defence of common values as vectors of legitimization of both internal and external EU policies; and (3) these same values are subject to multiple interpretations.

70 IEE-ULB affiliates are active on this research theme, which includes key topics such as:

- Europe as a laboratory for the management of social, cultural, religious and sexual diversity
- Fundamental rights and values: singularities or specificities of the European model
- What European social model in the face of the challenges of capitalism
- Institutionalisation of norms, public policy instruments and mobilisation in the name of values in a multi-level Europe.

RED SPINEL (2022 - 2026)

Horizon Europe-CL2-RIA: **Responding to Emerging Dissensus: SuPranational Instruments & Norms of European Liberal democracy**

- Lead Researcher: Ramona Coman
- Funding: HorizonEurope

DESCRIPTION

The Horizon Europe RED-SPINEL project investigates the evolving nature of dissensus over liberal democracy and examines its implications for the European Union’s supranational policy instruments. It explores how internal (within the EU and its Member States) and external (beyond Europe) sources of dissensus influence the EU’s institutional responses, policymaking processes, and governance practices. Led by the Université libre de Bruxelles (ULB), the RED-SPINEL consortium brings together seven academic and four non-academic partners from eight European countries, fostering collaboration across disciplines and sectors.

During the academic year, IEE researchers affiliated with RED-SPINEL actively contributed to analyzing the nature of dissent surrounding liberal democracy and its implications for EU action.

The Special issue *Dissensus over Liberal Democracy in Europe* co-edited by **Ramona Coman** and **Nathalie Brack** with *European Political Science* brought together the articles by several IEE and ULB academics and researchers, including **Martin Deleixhe**, **Leonardo Puleo** and **Marta Matrakova**. The articles in this special issue present not only the conceptualisation and typology of dissensus but also the networks of actors involved.

As the role of actors is key to understanding the nature of dissensus over liberal democracy, the volume *Dissensus over Liberal Democracy: Insights from European Judges* (Hart Publishing, 2025), co-edited by **Ramona Coman** (ULB), **Viktor Kazai** (ULB), **Leonardo Puleo** (ULB), and **Andrew Bradley** (ULB), examines what judges do and how they perceive their roles in the context of growing dissensus over liberal democracy. The book features interviews with 18 judges from various EU and non-EU Member States and courts, complemented by a series of academic commentaries discussing the relationship between law and politics in times of dissensus over liberal democracy. Each narrative reveals unique personal experiences and reflections, shedding light on the role of the judiciary and the rule of law in the face of contemporary challenges. The **pre-launch book event** took place at the Institute for European Studies on June 5 with the participation of several European judges.

Continuing to focus on actors, RED-SPINEL researchers from ULB and the University of Warwick, in collaboration with Survation, organized a foresight exercise to better understand how dissensus over liberal democracy is perceived within EU institutions, in the Member States, and within civil society. The results of this innovative study can be found in the publication *RED SPINEL – Forecasting Dissensus over Liberal Democracy: How Key Actors View the EU’s Role and Future Scenarios*.

In 2025, all researchers involved in the RED-SPINEL project also contributed chapters to The Palgrave Handbook on Dissensus over Liberal Democracy in Europe, edited by **Ramona Coman** (ULB), **Claudia Badulescu** (ULB), **Thomas Christiansen** (Luiss University), and **Marta Simoncini** (Luiss University).

Researchers from RED-SPINEL affiliated with the IEE-ULB also contributed to the dissemination of the project’s findings and to discussions with members of the academic community at national and international conferences.



In September 2024, **Chloé Brière (ULB)** and **Viktor Kazai (ULB)** organised at the IEE the training course entitled “The Mobilisation of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights in Strategic Litigation”.

RED-SPINEL has been represented in various international conferences by several IEE affiliated members. **Amandine Crespy**, **Pauline Thinus**, and **Dimitros Argyroulis** participated to the *UACES Annual Conference* (Trento, Italy September 2024). **Ioanna Christodoulaki (ULB)**, **Dimitros Argyroulis**, and **Viktor Kazai** attended the Citizen forum “**Innovative Economic Governance Practices and 21st-Century Liberal Democracy**” at HEC Paris, September 2024. Two RED SPINEL panels featuring **Ramona Coman**, **Luca Tomini**, **Claudia Badulescu**, **Pauline Thinus**, **Frederik Ponjaert**, and **Andrew Bradley** were organised in July 2025 at the **28th World Congress of the International Political Science Association (IPSA) in Seoul**.

To continue engaging with diverse audiences, RED-SPINEL has also produced:

- A podcast series within the IEE’s *Making Sense* of EU series.
- A newsletter highlighting project updates and research outcomes.
- Open-access resources, including books, practitioner handbooks, training materials, working papers, policy briefs, and country reports.

GEM-DIAMOND (2022 - 2026)

Horizon Europe-MSCA-DN: **Globalisation, Europe and Multilateralism: Democratic Institutions, the rise of Alternative Models and mounting Normative Dissensus**

- Lead Researcher: Ramona Coman
- Funding: Marie Skłodowska-Curie Action – Joint Doctorate

DESCRIPTION

This Marie Skłodowska-Curie Action Doctoral Network builds on the successful ‘GEM’ and ‘GEM-STONES’ projects previously led by the IEE. It is entitled ‘GEM-DIAMOND - Globalisation, Europe and Multilateralism: Democratic Institutions, the rise of Alternative Models and mounting Normative Dissensus’. The project focuses on how the growing dissensus surrounding liberal democracy, both within and beyond Europe, has impacted the EU’s capacity to act through its internal and external policy instruments.

The project allows for 16 early-career researchers to conduct PhD projects. They will answer both conceptual and empirical questions surrounding the future of liberal democracy in Europe in the face of growing dissensus. GEM-DIAMOND’s researchers first unpack the internal (within the EU and its member states) and external (beyond Europe) drivers of the growing dissensus surrounding liberal democracy. Subsequently, the 16 PhD researchers analyse a set of individual cases to draw lessons on the continued effectiveness and legitimacy of the EU’s political and socio-economic policy instruments considering the mounting dissensus surrounding liberal democracy.

GEM-DIAMOND aims to collectively tackle three shared knowledge gaps regarding contemporary strains on liberal democracy:

1. Conceptualizing the seemingly mounting dissensus over liberal democracy.
2. Unpacking the ambiguous role different actors can play as both champions and challengers of liberal democratic norms, values and practices.
3. Assessing the impact of increased dissensus regarding liberal democracy on the policy instruments of the EU and its capacity to act in its internal and external policies.



GEM-DIAMOND involves a consortium of 11 academic partners - Université libre de Bruxelles, Libera Università Internazionale degli Studi Sociali Guido Carli, Universiteit van Amsterdam, Universitatea Babes-Bolyai, Københavns Universitet, Université Parisi Panthéon-Sorbonne, Université de Genève, University of Warwick, Waseda University, Université Laval, and Fundação Getulio Vargas, **and 6 non-academic partners** - Instituto Affari Internazionali, German Marshall Fund, Egmont, PATRIR, Centre for European Policy Studies and the International Federation for Human Rights.

In academic year 2024-2025, GEM-DIAMOND has seen the initial signs of its collective endeavours come to fruition, while the 16 individual doctoral research projects have proceeded as scheduled. All 16 PhD projects are scheduled to be concluded and submitted over the course of academic year 2025-2026.

If the year 2024-2025 saw GEM-DIAMOND publish its initial scientific deliverables, the rate of delivery is set to increasing over the subsequent twelve months as the project nears its conclusion.

RESEARCH THEME 4

EUROPE IN THE WORLD

Europe in the World’ is the fourth crosscutting theme of research in the IEE-ULB in terms of global governance, notably the interactions between global policy and European policies. This IEE-ULB’s research theme studies the EU’s place in global governance through its interactions with other political, legal, economic and social models in international exchanges. This theme has two specificities. On the one hand, it examines these interactions in different geographical areas (e.g. Russia, Caucasus, Balkans; Asia; Americas; Mediterranean area etc.). On the other hand, it aims at deepening the EU’s relations with third countries, regional or international organisations. It also looks at how other international actors perceive the EU, its policies and its role at the international level.

NAVIGATOR (2023-2026)

DESCRIPTION

NAVIGATOR involves the following partners: Norsk Utenrikspolitisk Institutt, Conpenhagen Business School, Université libre de Bruxelles, Universiteit Maastricht, University of the Witwatersrand Johannesburg, Unoversità Commerciale Luigi Bocconi, Vereniging voor Christelijk Hoger Onderwijs, Wetenschap NL Partner, ECFR Deutschland e.V. Germany Partner, the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Tallinna Tehnikaülikool, the Transatlantic Foundation, University of Ottawa, Waseda University.

NAVIGATOR’s main objective is to deliver a ready-to-use “search mechanism” and associated pathways of action that the EU and its member states can use as it seeks to strengthen a rules-based international order. To achieve this, **NAVIGATOR comprises a strong, global and interdisciplinary team of researchers who explores institutional variation on six policy issues** – climate change, digitalization, finance/ tax, health, migration and security – to identify what institutional mixes enable the EU to have optimal impact in a given policy issue.

NAVIGATOR main objectives are: (1) to assess the effectiveness of multilateral institutions and arrangements; (2) to identify the optimal pathways of action of EU support to multilateral, private and public-private initiatives to further global governance in a given policy domain, and (3) to provide recommendations for EU engagement strategies in the context of the war in Ukraine, threats of nationalism and anti-EU populism.

In the past months, several activities have been carried out of the framework of the Navigator project.

The project’s consortium prepared and published several scientific outputs, all available on the project’s website (<https://eunav.eu/>).

- **First Forecasting Report**, authored by Alberto Tagliapietra (GMF) and released in February 2025. It explores possible futures for the multilateral system and their implications for the EU. The report outlines three plausible global scenarios by 2030: institutional reform and renewed consensus, increasing bilateral tensions within a fragmented order, and the collapse of multilateralism. In all cases, it stresses the urgency of EU strategic foresight and adaptability.
- Seven thematic **Working Papers** were published in February 2025 analyzing the EU’s engagement across multilateral governance fields, covering security, migration, health, digitalisation, climate action, finance and regional perspectives. These papers offer targeted insights for researchers and policymakers navigating today’s complex governance arenas.
- Launch of the **NAVIGATOR Podcast Series**, as part of Making Sense of EU, the podcast series from the Institute. The series brings cutting-edge research to wider audiences through engaging expert conversations. Released themes so far include introduction of the project, the methodology, climate diplomacy and the end of international cooperation. Further episodes will be published in the coming months.

Two events were also organised. First, on 25 March 2025, NAVIGATOR convened its second expert groups meeting, hosted in Berlin by the European Council for Foreign Relations under the theme **“Europe’s Approach to International Cooperation in a Trumpian World.”** The event brought together senior experts, academics, and policymakers to discuss the EU’s position in an increasingly transactional world order. The day included a keynote by former **German State Secretary** Dr. Franziska Brantner and a panel on emerging governance formats. The following day, NAVIGATOR ran a scenario-building workshop to explore strategic EU responses to three distinct futures: cooperative, transactional, and fragmented global orders. Participants engaged in discussions on how the EU could preserve legitimacy and leadership by embracing flexibility, coalition-building, and informal cooperation. Secondly, on 5 May 2025, NAVIGATOR held a regional workshop at the University of the Witwatersrand.

The event brought forward African perspectives on multilateral reform. Sessions addressed African agency, migration governance, and the future of the G20 and UN Security Council, with a strong emphasis on decolonial and solidarity-based approaches.



EUIP (2022-2026)

Erasmus+ - **Jean Monnet Policy Network on “The EU and the Indo-Pacific”**

DESCRIPTION

This Network – encompassing EU and Indo-Pacific partners – has started its initial fieldwork (interview rounds orchestrated by the East Asian partners) aimed at assessing the critical question of “what is the most effective role for the EU in the Indo-Pacific?” The EU’s effectiveness in the region will rely on accurate contemporary knowledge of the states of the Indo-Pacific. This Network will create a unique grouping of EU and Indo-Pacific expertise (involving a mixture of academics, think- tankers, and foreign policy officials from both the EU and third countries) to conduct interviews, engage in Delphi style policy debates, and “policy sandpits” in eight Indo-Pacific countries: Australia, China, Indonesia, Japan, New Zealand, South Korea, Taiwan, and Thailand. Early career researchers (especially post-docs and PhD students) from all the participating universities will be heavily involved in the project as well. The Network will provide high- level foreign policy analysis, forecasting, and outputs that will be of significant use for practitioners in the European External Action.

POLYCIVIS (2023-2026)

“Confronting the Polycrisis in Europe and Africa through Research, Policy and Education”

DESCRIPTION

PolyCIVIS is a Euro - African collaboration that brings to the forefront the global polycrisis, allowing a better understanding of the impacts of several concurrent major societal crises challenging the world in the form of a polycrisis. Initiated in late 2023, PolyCIVIS allows discussion, collaboration and action arising out of the collaboration between universities in Europe and Africa. A Jean Monnet Network, (Policy Debate: Foreign policy issues: EU-AFRICA), PolyCIVIS mobilises a consortium of 21 universities: all 11 CIVIS Alliance universities, all 6 CIVIS African strategic partners, and an additional 4 African universities.

During the second year of the PolyCIVIS project, the consortium convened its Annual Conference in Dakar, Senegal, from 23 to 26 April 2025. Within the framework of the Conference, an Agora Forum entitled “*Strengthening Europe-Africa Cooperation on Climate, Environment, and Energy Transition in a Polycrisis Era*” was organised, culminating in the publication of the Dakar Communiqué.



One intensive Blended Intensive Programme (BIP) on *Euro-Africa Trade and Investment Relations and the Polycrisis* was successfully delivered. Three additional BIPs on Strategic Foresight; *Understanding the Polycrisis: Studies in Polycrisis, Fragility, and Resilience*; and *Enhancing Skills in Polycrisis Management: African and European Approaches*, respectively, are scheduled to take place during the 2025/26 academic year.

During the reporting period, ten Policy Briefs were issued, offering up-to-date practical insights and strategic guidance for navigating the complexities of the polycrisis. Significant progress was also achieved on the project’s principal research output, a forthcoming volume entitled *Facing the Polycrisis Together: Context and African–European Perspectives*, which is scheduled for publication in 2026.



RESEARCH COMMUNITY

Academics and researchers from across the ULB can affiliate to the IEE if their work refers to European integration in all its forms and is congruent with the IEE's research agenda. The IEE also welcomes external scientific collaborators and visiting researchers.

By the end of 2024-2025, the academic community brought together by the IEE-ULB included some 143 members. It included 115 affiliated ULB-based researchers - 60 academics as well as 55 doctoral and post-doctoral fellows. Furthermore, 28 external researchers joined the community temporarily - including 16 scientific collaborators and 12 visiting researchers.

The interdisciplinarity of the IEE-ULB refers to European integration in all its forms and is congruent with the IEE's research agenda. 13 research centres and units from across 5 Faculties: the Faculty of Philosophy and Social Sciences; the Faculty of Law and Criminology; the Faculty of Arts, Translation, and Communication; the Faculty of Psychology, Education Sciences and Speech Therapy; and Solvay Brussels School of Economics & Management.

ECLAN - European Criminal Law Academic Network

The European Criminal Law Academic Network (ECLAN) was set up by Anne Weyembergh and Serge de Biolley in 2004. Its activities were launched on 1 December 2004. It is now co-coordinated by Anne Weyembergh (ULB), Katalin Ligeti (University of Luxembourg) and Valsamis Mitsilegas (Queen Mary University of London). The network covers 32 states, i.e. the 27 Member States of the European Union, as well as 5 third States (Switzerland, Norway, Iceland, Bosnia-Herzegovina, and the UK) with which the Union maintains close relations in the field of police and criminal justice. It brings together more than 150 professors and researchers specialised in European criminal law.

During the 2024–2025 academic year, several meetings were held among members of the network:

- **Two Management Committee (MC) meetings** took place in hybrid format on 16 May 2025 and 18 August 2025. These meetings primarily focused on assessing applications for new membership and launching a discussion on ways to further revitalize the network and ensure its long-term sustainability, including through the potential use of structural funding.
- **A Contact Points (CP) meeting** was also organized in hybrid format on 16 May 2025 to discuss, among other matters, the network's forthcoming activities.

This year was further marked by a series of initiatives aimed at promoting knowledge in the field of European criminal law, through both academic events and publications.

Events

- The **annual doctoral seminar** was hosted by Utrecht University (The Netherlands) on 10–11 April 2025. Under the theme “*The 15th Anniversary of the Treaty of Lisbon: Reflections on the Past, Present and Future of EU Criminal Law Under the Treaty of Lisbon*”, the seminar provided an opportunity for some thirty early-stage researchers to present their work.
- The **annual conference of the network**, organized by the University of Latvia, took place in Riga on 15–16 May 2025. The conference addressed the theme “*The Presumption of Innocence: Modern Trends and Contemporary Challenges*.”
- The **ECLAN Summer School 2025**, dedicated to “*The EU Area of Criminal Justice*,” was held from 30 June to 4 July 2025. This year's programme offered a comprehensive course on the external dimension of judicial cooperation in criminal matters. The Summer School brought together numerous speakers, both academics and practitioners, and attracted around thirty participants from across Europe and beyond.

Publications

- The publication of **ECLAN Newsletters No. 32 and No. 33**, which provided a comprehensive overview of recent legislative and case-law developments in European criminal law, together with updates on recent and forthcoming publications and relevant conferences, covering the period from July 2024 to July 2025.
- The continued **coordination of the “Hart Series in EU Criminal Law” (Hart Publishing)** by the network's co-coordinators, along with the co-sponsorship and collaboration with the specialist journal *New Journal of European Criminal Law* (SAGE).
- The publication of collective volumes coordinated by network members, including:

ODYSSEUS -European Migration and Asylum Law Network



The ODYSSEUS Network is the largest Network of academics and experts on immigration and asylum law in Europe. The ODYSSEUS Network was established in 1999 and is coordinated by its founder, Philippe De Bruycker, a professor at the Centre de droit européen and the Institut d'études européennes. The Network's objective is to provide expertise on EU law relating to borders, visas, immigration and asylum. It currently comprises over 50 experts from each of the EU Member States, as well as from Norway, Iceland, Switzerland and Turkey.

Odysseus Members charted an **Executive Master's in EU Migration and Asylum Law**. The program aims to provide participants with an in-depth understanding of the legal rules on migration and asylum adopted by the EU. It is an **online program** that includes **3 mandatory gatherings in Brussels**. The choice of this hybrid version is to allow students from all over Europe to follow the classes, without missing the opportunity to meet and exchange in person. Specific issues will be discussed during these meetings to improve participants' understanding and meeting **leading host speakers**.

KEY PARTNERSHIPS

ULB-VUB Joint Research Group with BSoG



The IEE has a long-standing partnership with its counter-part at the VUB, the Brussels School of Government (BSoG). This partnership has taken on various guises, with two major co-organized conferences becoming the centrepiece of the cooperation: on the one hand, the Interdisciplinary Conference in Advanced European Studies (IDEAS) hosted in the month of May in even years, and the European Union in International Affairs (EUIA), hosted in the month of May in odd years. As such, the IEE and BSoG (along with the University of Warwick) collaborated in 2024-2025 with an eye on organising the 2025 iteration of the EUIA conference held in May 2025. The cooperation between BSoG and IEE is developed in the framework of the joint Research Group, funded by the authorities of the two universities and scheduled to run until the end of the academic year 2025-2026.

Brussels and Florence as Political and Intellectual 'capitales' of Europe: collaboration IEE-EUI



The IEE has been at the vanguard of the partnership agreement signed in 2023 by the European University Institute (EUI) and the ULB. Its interdisciplinary drive and European purpose are in full congruence with the EUI's missions. Collaborations range from scientific and teaching activities to contributions to the public debate, such as a joint seminar 'Narrating Europe' launched in 2024. Students and scholars commuted between both institutions for academic stays. These first achievements pave the way for future common projects. Furthermore, the director of the Robert Schuman Centre Erik Jones integrated the Strategic Council of the IEE to mutualize institutional experiences.

Privileged Partnership with Waseda University



The IEE strategic partnership with the Graduate School of Asia-Pacific Studies (GSAPS) at Waseda University consolidated further across all dimensions of the IEE's activities. In terms of mobility, a new Memorandum of Understanding was signed with the Law faculty of Waseda university to facilitate academic mobility of legal scholars over the next four years. The exchange program linking GSAPS and the IEE's interdisciplinary specialisation master saw further mobility in 2024-2025 with students heading in both directions. The Double Master in European and Asian studies continued to attract registrations at a stable rate. The International Chair integrated into the specialisation master allowed the invitation of guest lecturers from Waseda. Joint research and publications continued to develop, notably at the 2024 EU-Japan Forum hosted in February of 2025.

This year's 3 workshops focused on: "EU and Japan Approaches to International Criminal Justice" ; "Politics and culture inside/out: a new 'policy-mix' in Europe and Japan?" and "New approaches and challenges for the post-Fukushima assessment of nuclear risk"

Privileged Partnership with University of Warwick



The bilateral partnership between the IEE at the ULB and the Politics and International Affairs (PaIS) department of the University of Warwick stretches back over two decades. Initiated by the late professor Eric Remacle in the field of European external action, it has since grown in scope to cover all four of the IEE's research agendas. Over academic year 2024-2025 the partnership involved the co-organisation of the European Union in International Affairs (EUIA) conference in May 2025.



PUBLICATIONS

The IEE manages three peer-reviewed book series in European studies. Edited and directed by scholars affiliated to the IEE, the series are published in collaboration with recognized academic publishing houses, two of them with the editions de l'Université de Bruxelles and one with Routledge. These series covering the full gamut of disciplines involved in European studies, provide a qualitative and highly visible outlet for ongoing research being developed at the IEE-ULB and its partner institutions.

Commentaries J. Mégret - Éditions de l'Université de Bruxelles

Series Editors: Marianne DONY

Series published by the University of Brussels. Founded in the 1970s by Prof. Jacques Mégret and directed by Prof. Marianne Dony; this series provides systematic commentaries on the articles of the European Treaties. With over 40 volumes already published, it serves as a reference in the field of European law.

Collection: European Studies - Éditions de l'Université de Bruxelles

Series Editors: Chloé BRIÈRE & François FORET

The collection publishes legal and political science works on the major themes of European integration. Created and directed from 1968 to 1999 by Jean-Victor Louis, the collection has been directed since 2012 by Prof. Marianne Dony and François Foret. The works published in the collection are characterized both by their critical vision of current issues in European construction and their methodological and disciplinary rigor: from constitutional law for Europe to the European Criminal Justice Area, from comparative politics to international relations, from the history of political ideas to analysis of the evolution of the EU's institutional system. This collection is accessible both to professionals working in the field of European integration, and to anyone wishing to learn more about European affairs.

Globalisation, Europe, Multilateralism - Routledge

Series Editors: Ramona COMAN & Frederik PONJAERT

Launched in 2013 by Prof. Mario Telò and Frederik Ponjaert, this series includes books, monographs and manuals aimed at contributing to scientific innovation in the fields of European and international studies. With over 30 volumes published to date, this series continues to position itself as a reference for both research and teaching professionals. Of particular importance over the past years has been the further increase in the number of monographs by early-stage researchers that were either published or greenlit for publication. As such, the series confirms its role as a publication outlet for high quality doctoral theses linked to the IEE, and this besides its function as a dissemination platform for interdisciplinary collective research produced by the IEE and its partners.

It brings together researchers, students and decision-makers to discuss issues of European integration.

PODCAST OF THE IEE: MAKING SENSE OF EU

Making sense of EU is a podcast in which researchers and academics from the IEE-ULB and members of the IEE's partner universities take part as part of its various research projects. It is organised into themed seasons of 5 to 10 episodes each. Since its launch in September 2022, Making Sense of EU has become a source of inspiration for the IEE's students, who decided to launch a 'mirror podcast' entitled 'Talking with EU: The Students' POV', to share their thoughts and ideas on the subjects covered with our researchers and academics.

During the academic year 2024-2025, the third season of «Making sense of EU» explored European efforts to navigate multilateral cooperation, as a part of the Horizon Europe NAVIGATOR project. This season included five episodes, presenting the NAVIGATOR project and its methodology as well as specific themes such as climate change and migration as well as the state of international cooperation both between countries and in different institutions and organisations.



Did you know that IEE-ULB has a YouTube channel where you can find a number of guest lectures and keynote talks?

The videos posted in 2024-2025 include for instance the Opening lecture of the academic year by Éloi Laurent and a video documentary presenting the main activities and findings of the EUqualis, Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence.
